Illustration:

Need: The issue of immigration in the United States is complicated but the responsibility of Christians is simple - represent Christ with our love, compassion, & hospitality.

## I. Biblical facts & principles I've learned regarding immigration.

- The Bible nowhere mentions anything about US laws and practices on immigration.
- All humans possess the image of God and are, as such, worthy of dignity. (Gen. 1:26-27)
- God ordained national governments to provide order and structure for human populations. (Rom. 13)
- It is the expectation of God-ordained government authorities to punish citizens who break laws within the framework of humane treatment in accordance to the crime. (Rom. 13)
- Scripture doesn't forbid nations from protecting boarders or determining who can or cannot enter.
- God's people are instructed and expected to obey the laws of the land unless by doing so one is required to violate God's righteous requirements. (Rom. 13)
- There seems to be a Hebrew differentiation between the words that describe those who classified as "aliens," (lit. ger) residents with granted permission, and those who are "foreigners," (lit. nekhar or zar) no permission granted. For more, see "The Immigration Crisis" by James Hoffmeier, chapter 2.
- All of the Biblical patriarchs were resident aliens who obtained permission to dwell in foreign lands. (Gen. 12-Ex. 1)
- The young nation of Israel were welcomed resident aliens in Egypt, but later were subjected to slavery. (Gen. 47-Ex. 1)
- God's moral law required that qualified resident aliens be treated with love, hospitality, and fairness; that they be included in the areas of employment, social benefits, and worship; and forbade Israel from mistreating, oppressing, or cheating them. (Ex. 22:21, 23:9, 12:48-49; Lev. 19:33-34, 18:26, 24:22, 19:9-13, 23:22, 16:19-30; Num. 15:15-16; Deut. 10:19, 24:14-15, 19-22, 26:12-13)
- Sanctuary cities in the OT were not designed to protect people "from the law" but from premature retaliation of the offended party. It provided a safe haven for due process.

## II. Biblical conclusions that nation states should consider regarding immigration.

- Every nation is free to protect their citizens/boarders and regulate immigration. However, every person, whether granted or denied entry, is to be treated with worth and dignity.
- Resident aliens are to be treated with clarity, fairness, and inclusion (legally, socially, and religiously).
- Every effort should be used to stop any and every instance of exploitation of both documented and undocumented aliens for the advancement of the bottom line.

## III. Biblical principles and conclusions that every Christian should consider regarding immigration.

- God is loving (Ps. 36:7), God is compassionate (Ps. 116:5), & God is a refuge for the oppressed (Ps. 9:9).
- Every Christian is to be marked by love (**Rom, 13:8-10**), compassion (**Col. 3:12**; **Luke 6:36**; **Gal. 6:2**), and hospitality (**Heb. 13:2, 16**; **Gal. 5:13**; **6:10**).
- Every Christian is a citizen of God's kingdom and a resident alien of this world (Phil. 3:20; 1 Pet. 2:11).
- The business of nations is sovereignty and security. The business of Christ is love, compassion, and hospitality. May no Christian's earthly connections speak louder than their eternal one!
- Pray regularly for those who are currently suffering in every facet of the immigration issue.
- Pray that God would give Oasis Church the mind of Christ regarding our role in the issues of immigration.
